Biographies


Nicholas Williams (piano)

Nicholas Williams is a pianist, writer and scholar based Western Australia. He is passionate about the music, pianos and performance styles of the nineteenth century. Studying at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA), Nicholas completed a Master of Arts (Performing Arts) in 2020, and was recipient of the Royal Overseas League Early Keyboard Prize in 2021. Active as both soloist and accompanist, Nicholas regularly performs in concerts around Perth, and has presented conference papers lecture-recitals Australia and internationally. in He is currently a PhD candidate and sessional piano teacher at WAAPA.

Nicholas started learning piano at a young age thanks to encouragement from his grandmother, Lynette Howieson, who had enjoyed considerable success as a soprano in Australia. His passion for music began to flourish around age thirteen, when he was first introduced to the music of Beethoven. Since then, Nicholas has enjoyed exploring music in all facets, including performing, improvising and composing, as well as researching historical performance.

Along with the modern piano, Nicholas specialises in playing pianos from the nineteenth century. As a researcher, he is interested in the performance





styles of the nineteenth century and early sound recordings, with a particular focus on the piano-playing tradition associated with Franz Liszt. In 2020, Nicholas completed his Master's thesis, entitled "A Study on Performing the Hungarian Rhapsodies in the Liszt Tradition." His PhD research focuses on the piano-playing of the great pianist and pupil of Liszt, Arthur Friedheim (1859 – 1932) through writings, recordings and reception history.


